adoptionchronicles | BACKGROUND

THE ADOPTION CHRONICLES PROJECT IS COMMITTED TO GATHERING STORIES FROM THE EPOCH OF ADOPTION WHICH TOOK PLACE BETWEEN 1920 AND 2020 - WHILE THERE IS STILL OPPORTUNITY TO SPEAK WITH THE PEOPLE WHOSE LIVES WERE TOUCHED BY THE ADOPTION EXPERIENCE.

The early 1920s marked the beginning of a new era of adoption, one that emphasized the safety and well-being of adopted children. Child welfare agencies were organized to conduct background checks on prospective adoptive parents and in-depth home studies became the norm. During this epoch, the act of adopting a child became regarded as a privilege rather than a right. Eventually, birth parents were given the opportunity to take part in the process of selecting the family that would adopt their child and a greater emphasis was placed on maintaining connections, whenever feasible, the child's genetic extended family network.

These positive changes spawned decades of reunions and ongoing relationships between adopted children and their birth families. Over time, millions of lives were touched as all members of the adoption triad experienced their own unique journey.

The Adoption Chronicles Project was envisioned as a way to record first-hand accounts of adoptees, birth parents and adoptive parents during this epoch. The project will endeavor to chronicle and showcase stories and experiences through the written word, photos and videos – before the memory of these experiences are lost due to the passing of time.

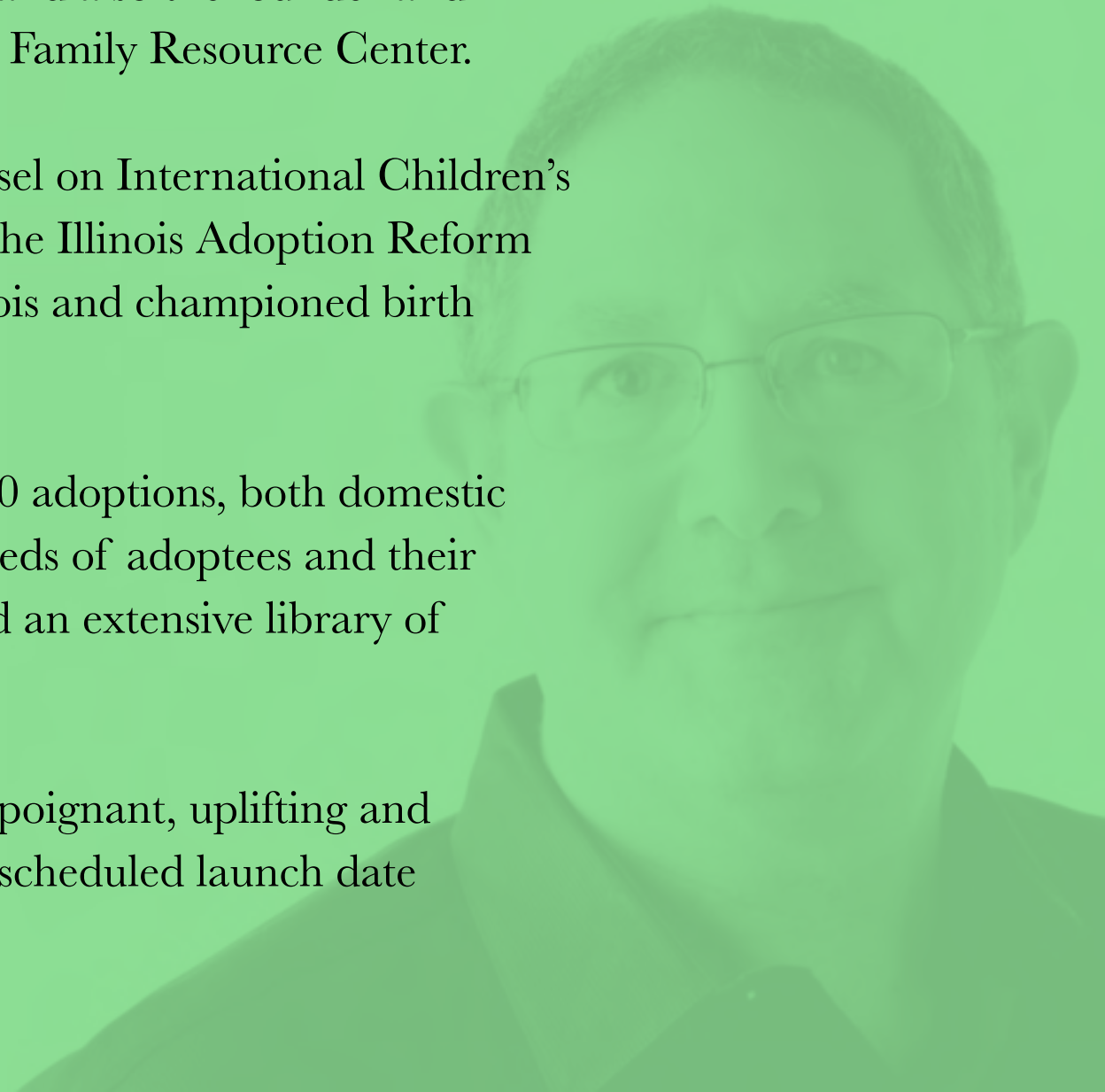
ABOUT THE FOUNDER

Richard Pearlman, is a licensed clinical social worker (LCSW) and also the founder and former executive director of the Adoption Center of Illinois at Family Resource Center.

He was a member of the board of directors of The Joint Council on International Children's Services (JCICS), and played a pivotal role in helping to draft the Illinois Adoption Reform Act, which ended the commercial practice of adoption in Illinois and championed birth parents' rights.

Having participated (directly and indirectly) in more than 4,500 adoptions, both domestic and international, Richard has maintained contact with hundreds of adoptees and their families – as well as professionals in the field – and has amassed an extensive library of adoption stories and experiences that spans generations.

Now retired, Richard has undertaken this effort to share these poignant, uplifting and sometimes difficult stories on a multi-channel platform, with a scheduled launch date during National Adoption Month, in November of 2024.

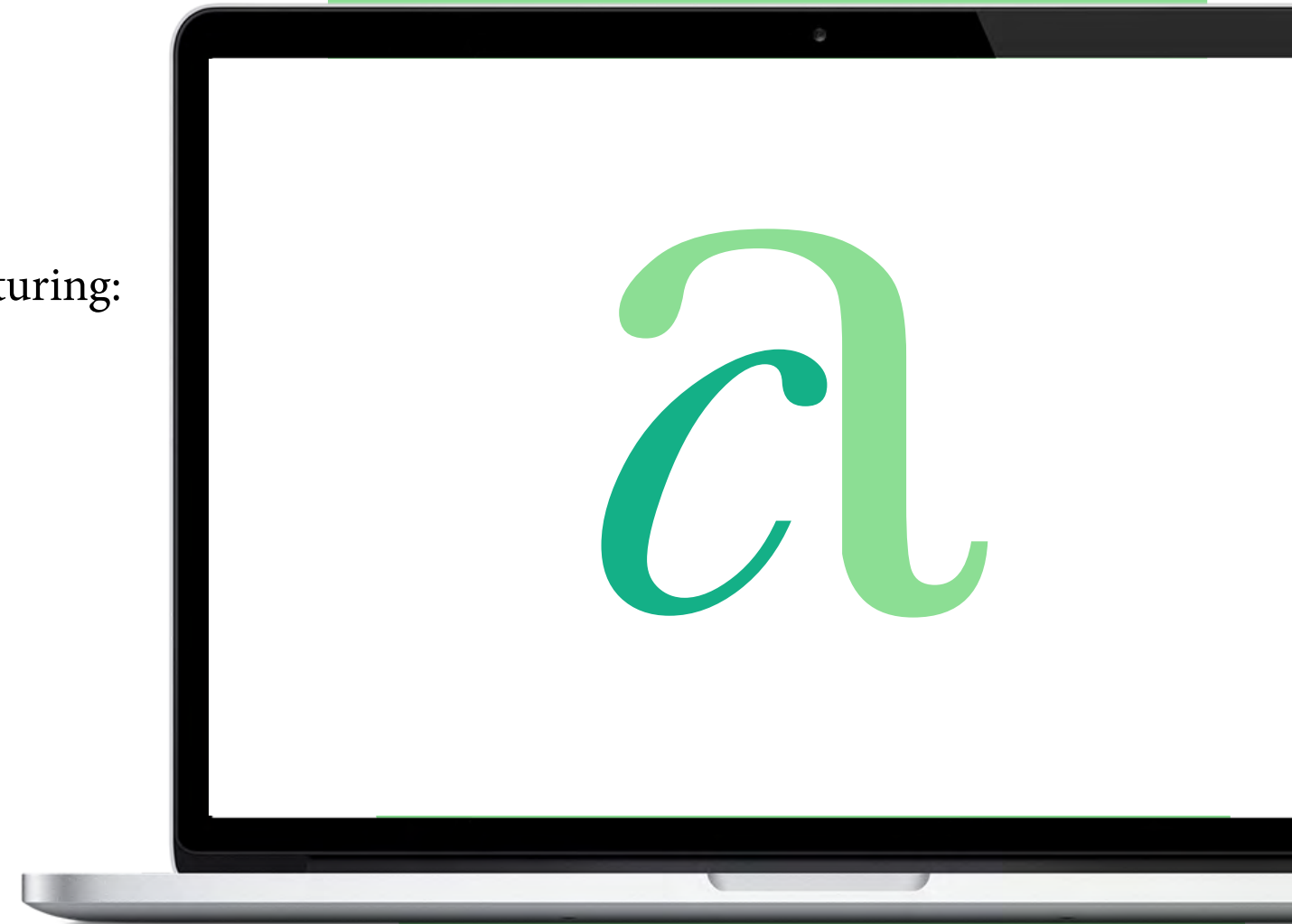

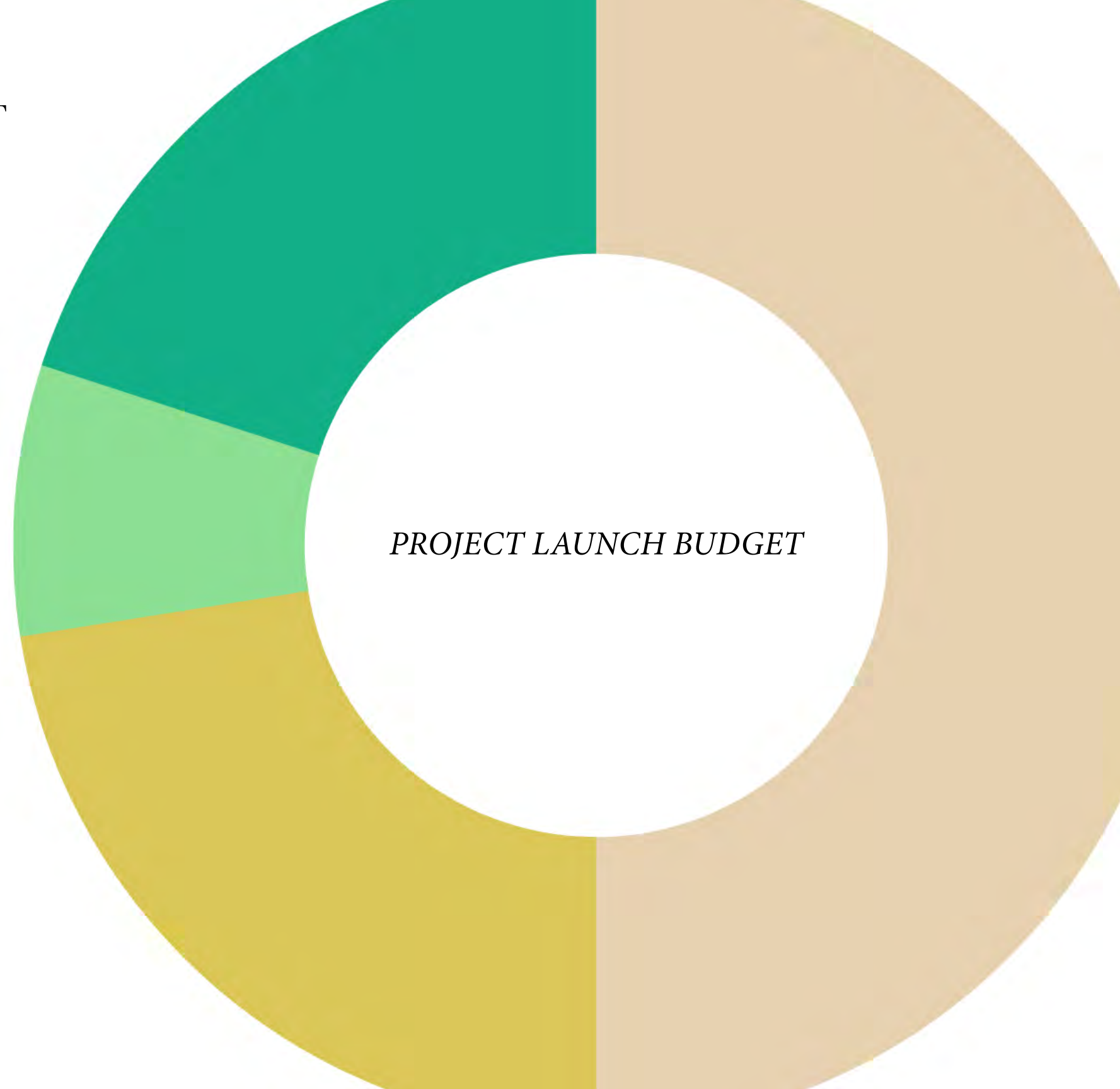
